#### ESSENTIAL CHARACTERISTICS OF MUSIC

• A rapidly widening repertoire used to create original, imaginative, fluent and distinctive composing and performance work.

• A musical understanding underpinned by a good level of aural perception, internalisation and knowledge of music, including developing levels of technical expertise.

• Very good awareness and appreciation of different musical traditions and genres.

• An excellent understanding of how musical provenance - the historical, social and cultural origins of music - contributes to the diversity of musical styles.

• The ability to give precise explanations, using musical terminology effectively, accurately and appropriately.

• A passion for and commitment to a diverse range of musical activities.




A range of rich and varied texts are available in classrooms and the school library which supplement the music curriculum. Where relevant, these may be used in lessons.

## **ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

Goring Church of England Primary School has many enrichment activities and extra-curricular activities for music. Children in Years 3 to 6 can learn a musical instrument. As well as whole-school weekly singing sessions, we have a choir for Years 3 to 6 and an orchestra with regular concerts.

For example, performing in the GAP Festival; singing carols at local care homes and leading the music in local church services.

#### **FEEDBACK**

ASSESSMENT FOR LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES Children are given meaningful feedback during music lessons from both peers and teachers.

Teachers make use of differentiated questioning, mini-plenaries and end-of-lesson plenaries which provide informal assessment opportunities. These help to gauge pupil understanding.

### MONITORING

**DEEP DIVES** 

The music co-ordinator regularly scrutinises the work completed in music lessons to ensure the curriculum is taught consistently across the school.

The music co-ordinator conducts whole school

deep dives. These provide an opportunity to observe lessons, talk to children, review planning and teaching and review strengths and areas for improvement across the school. After a deep dive is completed, a report is written and shared with staff and governors. Any actions that are required are then implemented in a timely fashion.
